The California Cities Gang Prevention Network, the first of its kind in the nation, focuses on successful policies and practices that interweave prevention, intervention, enforcement, and a community's "moral voice" as an alternative to prison-only solutions.

10:50am TRAUMA AND JUVENILE JUSTICE

Gabriella Grant, Expert on Trauma-Informed Practices

There is a close correlation between early childhood trauma, substance abuse and mental health issues and criminal justice involvement. When agencies better understand the effects of trauma on youth, youth's coping and their need for a sense of safety, they can improve outcomes for criminal justice-involved youth by becoming 'trauma-informed.' This presentation will review the research, the framework to become trauma-informed and highlight specific evidence-based practices that agencies can use to work more effectively with youth.
